



Conversation among GRITIM-UPF members about the exodus from Ukraine

During the session, GRITIM-UPF scholars specializing in migration and refugee dynamics, bordering processes and geopolitics will discuss the humanitarian crisis caused by the war in Ukraine in a human rights and international relations framework. The intended outcome is a joint publication on this topic.

Some of the key questions approached are:

- How do we build a research agenda that is refugee-centric and focused on the voices and experiences of the most marginalized?
- How we can analyze the European answer, both at political and social level?
 What are the implications for the treatment of migration and refugee issues in the near future?
- How do we navigate the pressures of conducing academic research with the moral obligations to help in a humanitarian crisis?
