9:30h-11:00h - Interculturalism and evidence-based policies

Format: The Panel will be coordinated by SIMC (total 1.5 h). The debate will be structured in two rounds. During the first round, the chair will ask each participant a question regarding Interculturalism, whereas, in the second round, they will be asked a question about evidence-based policy. Each speaker will have 5 minutes to answer each of the questions. Once every round has finished, there will be an open discussion with the other participants.















Framing the debate: Sub-national levels of government play a crucial role when designing and developing inclusion and cohesion policies. Traditionally, there has been three models to manage migration: guest-workers model, assimilationism, and multiculturalism. Although, all three models have succeeded in some aspects, they have failed to foster a holistic view of inclusion. In this context, interculturalism appears as a new paradigm to manage diversity. To be able to implement interculturalism at all levels, everybody must understand what this model means when we go from concepts to policies and implementation. As part of its work on key current topics of the European migration and integration debate, ReSOMA has elaborated on the elements of such a comprehensive, holistic approach to long-term integration. To better support the understanding of the paradigm and its benefits, policy-makers must rely on data not only to implement the model, but also to communicate what they are doing, the results they are obtaining, and to counter hate speech when speaking about migration.

11:15h-14:15h - Migration Observatory: Typologies and Multi-level Functions

Format: This Panel will be coordinated by ACSAR (total 3 hours). This will be a roundtable discussion with 4 speakers and a Chair. Each speaker will have 15 minutes. The Chair will manage time strictly and coordinate the debate with the other participants/audience. A rapporteur from Acsar will take notes. After the roundtable (90 minutes), invited commentators will have 5 minutes to introduce and give their comments (this can take 60 minutes) followed with an open discussion (30 minutes).
















Framing the debate: Migration Observatories collect data and produce information and knowledge for evidence-based policy-making, and social practices, as well as grounding empirical research. They can also have the purpose of promoting dialogues between politics/policies, civil society and academia, they can also provide critical diagnosis on current migration-related events. Potentially, they can play a key role in the upcoming needs assessments and national programming efforts in EU programmes such as AMIF and ESF+, which are crucially important for integration spending in several countries. The purpose of this roundtable is two-fold. First, to better understand the different typologies of Observatories in Europe, their concrete functions, challenges and first self-evaluation. Second, to assess the place of Migration Observatories within the set of stakeholders influencing migration policymaking and dynamics. For example, they may have a role in partnership-based implementation of EU funding programmes or monitor the implementation of Global Compacts on Refugees and on Migrants - these are ReSOMA topics which the participating observatories are invited to comment on. The interlinks between knowledge production, politics and politicies, as well as the autonomy of Observatories.
