

Josep L Barona is a professor of history of science at the University of Valencia. He has been Visiting professor at the Universities of Oxford and Bergen (Norway), researcher at the Rockefeller Archive Center (New York), and Salvador de Madariaga researcher at the European University Institute (Florence). Since 2017 he is a visiting professor at the Center for Advanced Studies of Kumamoto University (Japan), where he teaches postgraduate courses in the history of science.

He is a member of the Secció de Biologia de l'Institut d'Estudis Catalans, of the Royal Academy of Medicine of the Valencian Community and an honorary member of the Institute of Medieval and Renaissance Studies and Digital Humanities of the University of Salamanca. He is a regular contributor to cultural magazines (L' Espill, Mètode) and daily press.

His research is focused on the social and political study of health, hunger and nutrition in Europe in early 20th century and Interwar years, based on historical holdings from the League of Nations, Rockefeller Archive Center, WHO, and FAO, among other. Some research issues are: health policies, health emergencies, circulation of nutrition knowledge, and rationing policies in times of crisis. Main cornerstone is the historical analysis of health/disease as an essential historiographical reference to understand the evolution of contemporary societies. Further research on the exile of Spanish republican scientists.

Among his most recent books: *Nutritional Policies and International Diplomacy* (Brussels, Peter Lang, 2021), where he analyzes nutritional and public health policies in interwar Japan; and *Health Policies in Interwar Europe. A transnational perspective* (London, Routledge, 2019), comparative analysis of health policies in Europe in the first half of the 20th century.
