

FRANCISCO JAVIER MARTÍNEZ is Associate Professor at the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Zaragoza. Doctor in History of Science at the Autonomous University of Barcelona, he has worked as postdoctoral researcher at SPHERE (CNRS-Université Paris Diderot); the Centre Jacques Berque in Rabat; CCHS-CSIC in Madrid; the University of Bergen; IMÉRA Marseille; and CIDEHUS (University of Évora).

He is specialized in the history of medicine, public health, and humanitarian relief in Spain's modern empire, particularly Morocco, Cuba and the Philippines. He has also studied locally-driven processes of scientific modernization in those territories and is currently investigating the production, use and effects of chemical weapons during the so-called Rif War of 1921-1926.

Recent publications include the article "A thread of life: Mahbub al-Mahmud and medical modernization in early twentieth century Morocco" in the *Bulletin of the History of Medicine* (2022); the edited volumes *Entangled peripheries. New contributions to the history of Portugal and Morocco* (Publicações do CIDEHUS, 2020) and (with John Chircop) *Mediterranean quarantines, 1750-1914. Space, identity and power* (Manchester University Press, 2018); and the collective dossier "The Pasteur institutes in the Maghreb during the colonial period" in the journal *Dynamis* (2016).
