## ***Criminal Records Disclosure and Recidivism in the Digital Age***

Universitat Pompeu Fabra (UPF), Barcelona – Thursday 13th of June 2019

### **Description:**

Criminal convictions have ‘collateral’ consequences beyond the effects stated in the sentence: ex-offenders are frequently discriminated against in the labour and housing market, and in other social interactions, when their criminal records are disclosed. These collateral consequences are criticized because they are automatic, frequently unknown, and their effects have been linked with recidivism.

This seminar presents the most innovative research on criminal records and recidivism in Europe and the US. The first two panels explore how the rapid technological change we live in has created new collateral consequences, but also new opportunities to address their effects. The third panel is directed at presenting the most innovative and robust studies on how to tackle recidivism in this evolving context.
